Colonel Ramey Wilson is an officer and internal medicine physician with a proven record of performance in a wide range of clinical and operational roles.

As a former Field Artillery Officer, he understands the tactical Commander's mindset and perspective and has leveraged that experience to provide expert advice, recommendations and care in deployed command billets and as a force provider preparing Special Operations Medics to be a ready medical force. Spending the majority of his active duty career with operational and expeditionary forces, which has included three deployments to Afghanistan in various roles with conventional and unconventional forces, he has intermittently returned to academics and the garrison military health system to learn, teach and practice medicine.

Dr. Wilson's expertise bridges the domains of expeditionary medical care, medical force generation and the delivery of medical care in our military treatment facilities. His most recent operational assignment as the Command Surgeon/Medical Director for Special Operations Command Africa—responsible for the health care of all US Special Operation military personnel in Africa, built upon his significant experience in the requirements and challenges of developing and sustaining a health support plan in austere locations.
